Who is eligible to apply?

The applicant must be an individual who is attending an SBB or Medical Laboratory Science/Technician School in Illinois. Post-doctoral students who are engaged in transfusion medicine are also eligible. The applicants must be residents of Illinois.

One of the following research materials must be submitted with your application:

- 1. **Research paper:** Traditional research paper that deals with transfusion medicine.
- Exhibit: This type of submission can include a poster presentation that is shipped rolled in a reusable carton. Written explanatory text must accompany the poster.
- Audiovisual production: This type
 of submission could include a
 videotape production that deals
 with transfusion medicine topic.
 The acceptable format includes
 DVD/VHS and must be no longer
 than 15 minutes in length.
- Graphic presentations: These must be submitted in widely acceptable computer storage media. These include websites, PowerPoint presentations and other computer-based entries.

The ARO Award is named in memory of Armando R. Orlina, MD, Medical Director of the Transfusion Medicine Division, Serology, and the Coagulation Laboratories at Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago, Illinois. His dedication to enhancing, supporting, and developing the principles of transfusion medicine was evident in his lifelong commitment to teaching and clinical research.

Dr. Orlina was a clinical professor in the Department of Pathology at the University of Illinois at Chicago, a consultant to LifeSource Blood Service, and an ad hoc member of the Sickle Cell Disease Branch subcommittee of the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute's Medical Advisory Committee.

Additionally, he was a clinical investigator and consultant with Terumo Medical Corporation and the Fenwal Division of Baxter Laboratories. His career included positions as Associate Professor of Clinical Pathology at the University of Chicago and Scientific Director at the Blood Center of Northern Illinois. He was the co-founder of the American Society for Apheresis (ASFA) and was honored as the first recipient of the Dr. Chang L. Lee Memorial Lectureship Award in 1992. His gifts as a prolific writer are revealed in his many publications, and he contributed his expertise as a reviewer for Archives of Internal Medicine, Blood, and the

Journal of Clinical Apheresis and Therapeutic Apheresis.

Dr. Orlina's professional accomplishments are further complemented by his mentorship of scores of students of transfusion medicine. His enduring presence in Chicago in the field of education is unsurpassed. He played a pivotal role in educating nationally-recognized experts in transfusion medicine, and is remembered by many in his field as one who always took the time to guide and educate others. Dr. Orlina was always available to those who sought knowledge.

In recognition of Dr. Orlina's scientific, academic, and teaching contributions to the field of transfusion medicine, IABB is proud to introduce the ARO Award.
